We served **132,451** people through our Corps Community Centers and programs in 2021.

Each year our Corps Community Centers meet the greatest needs throughout the islands to assist anyone requiring help - wherever they are. In addition to the provision of food and basic items for those displaced by disasters, our programs and services strengthen the physical, emotional, and spiritual wellness of our most vulnerable community residents. School keiki are given weekend meals and the homeless are cared for each week with meals, basic first aid, showers and laundry facilities.



Foodland Shares a Holiday Feast

In 1988, a Foodland customer on Maui wanted to donate a turkey to a needy family during Thanksgiving. She felt that other customers might want to do the same — and Foodland's Share a Holiday Feast Program was born. Over the years, customers have made donations during checkout by offering their cash and loose change, rounding up purchases to the nearest dollar and donating the difference, redeeming My Rewards certificates, and donating Maika'i points. Foodland then turns those donations into \$20 Share a Holiday Feast certificates that are distributed by The Salvation Army. Over the years, those certificates have provided holiday meals to thousands of families in need.

Through preschools, daycare, youth-focused programs, camps, and special programs for at-risk youth, we help children and teens develop self-confidence and a strong character to prepare them for future success.

Liane's story, A Family Life Changed by The Salvation Army

Liane is connected to The Salvation Army in a myriad of ways. She is an employee, bible study attendee, and worship team leader, and active participant in various Salvation Army programs and community events. Her family members are also current or former employees, and are members at the Kroc Center.

When her daughter was promoted to glory in a tragic plane crash, The Salvation Army's check-ins, prayers, meals, and emotional and spiritual support helped Liane and her family cope with their grief and the loss. Most importantly, Liane says The Salvation Army provided a healthy environment for her family to continue serving the community, taking the focus off themselves and putting it onto those who need it the most.



We provided substance abuse and alcohol treatment for **1,556** individuals in 2021.

Addiction is an epidemic, and our treatment services provide a pathway to recovery. The Salvation Army breaks the cycle of addiction and crisis by meeting people where they are and guiding them through their journey. Non-medical detoxifications, residential treatments, day treatments, and intensive outpatient treatments give people in recovery the tools they need to break through and start anew. We walk beside our clients on their path toward health and sobriety, ensuring lives are saved, families are reunited, and physical and spiritual health is achieved.

Richard's Journey of Hope

Richard struggled with drugs and alcohol his entire life. At the age of 17, his mother put him into treatment — but he didn't yet understand the concept of alcoholism and addiction. Over the years, his drug and alcohol use would result in ruined relationships, the ending of his career, and eventually, a near-death experience.

Finally, torn between ending his own life and getting help, Richard called a friend. Thankfully, that friend answered the phone right away, and immediately took Richard to The Salvation Army's detox program in Nu'uanu. Richard turned to God, got the help he needed, and has been sober since November 2014.

We assisted **25,905** individuals and families with housing assistance and utilities in 2021.

The Salvation Army Pathway of Hope initiative and The Salvation Army's network of services guides families through the support they need, because breaking the vicious cycle of poverty and crisis requires more than just services — it requires hope. Rather than simply addressing symptoms of poverty, we find the root cause so that we can guide families to a safe harbor where their lives can begin anew. We offer job training, housing, case management, counseling, treatment services, and child services within a supportive community that listens and understands while providing guidance and hope.

Cidney's Recovery - Women's Way, Ke Ola Pono

Cidney was pregnant and living in a tent when another homeless person notified The Salvation Army of her condition. Because of The Salvation Army's Women's Way program, the delivery of this baby was different from Cidney's previous pregnancies — she was offered drug treatment services and the option to keep her child. Time spent at Women's Way allowed Cidney to get sober and care for her; but unfortunately, her daughter passed away from a rare condition when she was just 23 months old. Through The Salvation Army's support, Cidney was able to overcome life's challenges once again, and has retained her sobriety. She is even working across the street from where her tent once stood, helping others who are currently experiencing homelessness.



We served **1,030,232** meals and provided **17,318** basic needs items in 2021

Homelessness exists even in paradise — but when life gets difficult, The Salvation Army is there to help. We provide hot meals through our soup kitchens; deliver food bags and clothing; and if needed, provide health, physical, and substance abuse counseling. We work with those experiencing homelessness to ensure families don't go to bed hungry and can live in safety and refuge.

In most communities in Hawai'i and the Pacific Islands, The Salvation Army is already at work providing needed assistance with our programs, honoring a century-old commitment to serve those in need at the time of need and at the place of need without discrimination.



Nadine Finds Relief

When Hawai'i's weather broke rainfall records in December 2021, Nadine's home flooded — and she wasn't sure who, if anyone, could help. Thankfully the Hawai'i Red Cross put Nadine and her children in touch with The Salvation Army. The next day, The Salvation Army helped secure temporary housing for nearly two weeks, until the rain stopped and their home returned to a livable condition. Through the ministry of The Salvation Army, Nadine and her family received food, shelter, clothing, and most importantly, hope for better days ahead.
