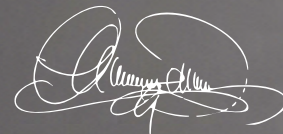

DOESN'T HAPPEN ALONE: THE STRENGTH OF COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Reimagining a House to a Home: FTS Cottage Renovations with ProsPac Holdings, Albert C. Kobayashi Inc.

Building a brighter future for mothers recovering from addiction and their keiki, real estate investment firm ProsPac Holdings was instrumental in the renovation of The Salvation Army Family Treatment Services (FTS) Hale in Honolulu. The firm's Executive Vice President, Rick Stack, inspired by his wife, Erin, who had learned of the good work of FTS and the need, rallied contractor Albert C. Kobayashi Inc. and other subcontractors to generously donate labor

and materials for the \$175,000 renovation project. ProsPac and Kobayashi Inc. contributed hands-on support to transform the facility, ensuring it would meet the needs of its sheltering mothers and their children.

The list of upgrades includes a new kitchen with a large island perfect for community cooking and socializing, new laundry units, fixtures, doors, ceiling fans and air conditioning, as well as upgraded flooring and fresh

paint. The repurposed residential cottage can accommodate up to 21 people at once with its eight bedrooms and four bathrooms, providing residents with a safe and supportive environment from which to participate in treatment and therapeutic services, relationship building classes, and recreational and cultural activities. The renovation was completed in late April 2024, with a Hawaiian blessing held in May.



Hilo Overnight Safe Space & Mālama ‘Ohana Kitchen Trailer

Two new resources to help care for Hawai‘i Island’s houseless individuals were made available to the community following the August 2024 dedication of The Salvation Army’s Hilo Overnight Safe Space and Malama ‘Ohana Kitchen Trailer. County of Hawai‘i Mayor Mitch Roth, together with state, county and other community partners, joined officers and representatives from The Salvation Army Hawaiian and Pacific Islands Division to mark the occasion. The Hilo Overnight Safe Space opened adjacent to

The Salvation Army Hilo Temple Corps Community Center, with the Mālama ‘Ohana Kitchen Mobile Trailer positioned to regularly provide shelter guests with nutritious meals, as well as mobilize for emergencies and community events. Made possible with support from both state and county funding, The Hilo Overnight Safe Space offers care and secure respite on a first-come, first-served basis. Up to 25 beds were made available for overnight stays each evening,

with the safe space additionally providing kennels for pets. It also serves as a hub for connecting the shelter’s overnight guests with additional resources and specific support services they may need to address mental health, substance abuse, food insecurity, and more. A generous anonymous donor provided funds for the purchase of the Mālama ‘Ohana Kitchen Trailer, which further complements the safe space operations and more.

Echelon’s Young Professionals Serve Youth Inside and Outside of the Classroom

Young professionals are inspiring the next generation of local youth through The Red Pencil project initiative by The Salvation Army Echelon Hawai‘i. Echelon volunteers, made up of local, civic-minded professionals, are providing keiki with both mentorship and the tools for success, including school supplies, and enriching learning activities.

Students at Kauluwela Elementary designed beautiful dinner mats for the Army’s annual Thanksgiving meal at the Neal

S. Blaisdell Exhibition Hall in Honolulu, serving over 1,700 people in 2024. The craft project was orchestrated by the Echelon team in close coordination with the school, following a special reading activity themed around the power of kindness during which participating students were each gifted copies of the featured book.

Hundreds of youth in the downtown Honolulu area face food insecurity, often relying on school lunches as their main source of nutrition during

the week. To help bridge the weekend hunger gap, Echelon and other committed community members volunteer with The Salvation Army Meals (SAM) Backpack Program, operated out of the Kauluwela Mission Corps.

Each Friday, the SAM program provides students with a “backpack” of nutritious food to help sustain them through the weekend. Local teachers have noted higher student attendance on distribution days and improved focus in the classroom come Monday.





Love Beyond Holiday Sponsors: Sharing the Spirit of Aloha All Year

From sustenance to shelter, the support of our Love Beyond The Holidays sponsors fills urgent needs for our most vulnerable families throughout the year. In 2024, and with generous backing from the City and County of

Honolulu, 26 corporate sponsors stepped up to not only bring hope and help at the holidays through meal services, gifts for keiki and kupuna, and more, but also to strengthen our year-round addiction treatment programs—

providing recovery services, counseling, and long-term support that help individuals and families break free from cycles of substance use and rebuild their lives.

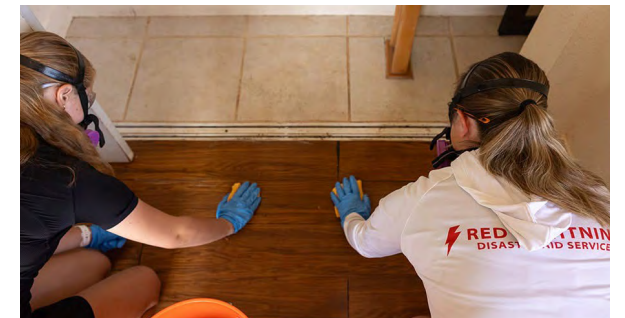
Red Lightning Partnership: Maui Smoke Remediation and Lahaina Aquatic Center

The Salvation Army Hawaiian and Pacific Islands Division initiated a strategic partnership with international nonprofit Red Lightning to support the Maui community following the Lahaina fire of 2023. These efforts are focused on aiding residents whose homes need specialized smoke remediation and testing services to be liveable again. Additionally, the partnership

will address fire damage at the Lahaina Aquatics Center and a playground adjacent to the local Boys & Girls Club that is like a second home for many of Maui's keiki.

In early July 2024, Red Lightning, together with expert support from select vendors, began cleaning and restoration operations at the aquatics center, with The

Salvation Army covering the necessary equipment and supply expenses. The organization plans to further strengthen and expand the partnership in 2025 as we continue the journey towards fuller community recovery and healing.



TRANSFORMING LIVES THROUGH HOPE AND ACTION

Paving a Pathway Forward

The Pathway of Hope is a trailblazing initiative by The Salvation Army to help families break the cycle of poverty through a personalized plan of action. Addressing barriers such as unemployment, unstable housing, and lack of education, the program equips participants with tools and resources to achieve long-term stability.

In August 2024, 16 families graduated from Pathway of Hope—one of the largest

graduating cohorts from the program—marked by a heartwarming ceremony at The Salvation Army's Camp Homelani. In December, a Christmas celebration for Pathway of Hope participants not only spread holiday cheer, but also reinforced the importance of hope and empowerment in the lives of families striving for positive change. The event held at the Kroc Center was supported by generous donations from Foodland, Anna Miller's, Devout

Electric, LLC., and Healani Land Company, which collectively helped to provide a delicious meal and hot cocoa bar, fun scavenger hunts with prizes, and Christmas gifts. Attendees also shared testimonies about the impact of the Pathway of Hope program in their lives, making the celebration a truly memorable experience.





Finding Safety and Success Through Family Intervention Services

Instilling purpose, life skills, and resiliency of spirit, The Salvation Army Family Intervention Services (FIS) uplifts at-risk adolescents on the Hawai'i Island and Maui. Vital programs include emergency shelters and prevention/intervention services for youth and their families.

Marking a significant milestone in the effort to provide safe, supportive housing and resources for young people, The Salvation Army's Noho 'Olu Safehouse for Girls was blessed in late October 2024, officially opening a new four-bedroom sanctuary for girls

ages 13-17. Based in Hilo, Noho 'Olu Safehouse for Girls is a vital and vibrant addition to the (FIS) portfolio, offering life skills and academic training, essential resources, and compassionate care to help each teen heal, thrive and instill hope for a brighter future.



Connecting Youth with Care and Community at Kroc

The formation of the Teen Club at Kroc Center Hawai'i originated from an organic community need that was met with both compassion and action. On many days after school, around 60 students from Hono'uli'uli Middle School—located across the street from the center—would come to hang out at Kroc after school. The waves of students caught the attention of Center Corps leadership—and what began as a situation of circumstance was transformed into an opportunity.

Rather than asking students to seek another afternoon hangout, the Kroc team got creative and the Teen Club was born. A close partnership was cultivated with the school, which serves a large population of economically disadvantaged families. The club started with Wednesday student gatherings—complete with free snacks, homework help, and engaging activities—then expanded to include no-cost open gym time on Mondays and Fitness Fridays. The Teen

Club kids also frequently stay for dinner and Kroc's teen Bible study. In August 2024, the Kroc Center and Echelon West O'ahu hosted a special Inspire Day at the Hono'uli'uli campus, where local businesses set up booths to introduce students to potential career paths after graduation and to raise awareness of the vibrant, growing Teen Club among the entire student body.

And beyond supporting our other iconic holiday programs such as the Red Kettle and Angel Tree campaigns—both further fueled by wonderful support from Walmart—these donors' efforts enable The Salvation Army to provide year-round programs that address our community's most pressing needs and vulnerable populations.

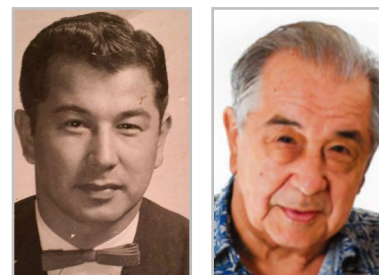

INSPIRED PLANNED GIVING: THE LEGACY OF DR. HEINZ-GUENTHER PINK



Born in 1933 Germany amid a heartbreaking and turbulent era, Heinz-Guenther Pink would rise from poverty with a deep calling to serve others—eventually finding purpose in Hawai‘i.

Abandoned at childbirth, and after living with a foster family and an abusive foster mother, he was left to fend for himself as a street child by the age of 10. Through the grace of God, unwavering faith, and an inspiring determination despite his war-torn surroundings, Heinz-Guenther overcame the seemingly insurmountable. A driven self-learner, he focused his sharp mind on education as a ticket to a better life. All the

while, he never forgot where he came from, and the struggles that too many young people navigate alone.

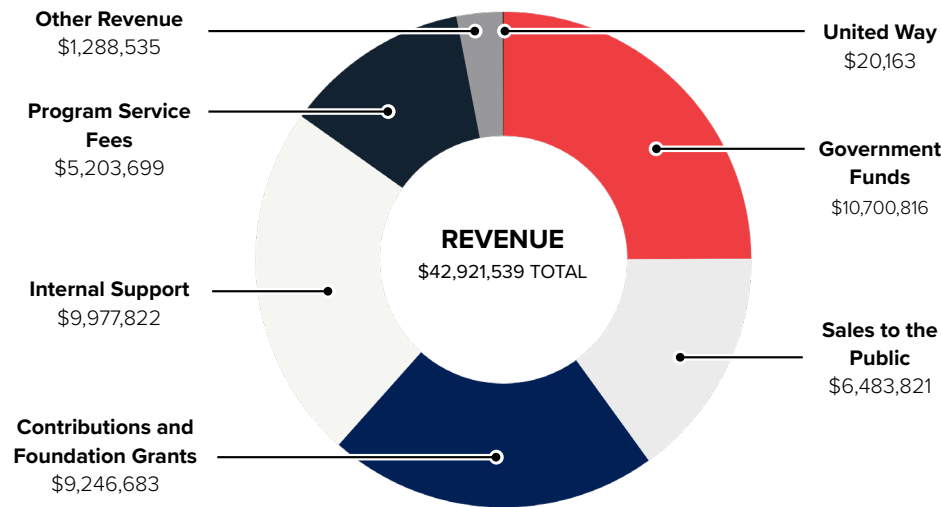
He went on to obtain a Ph.D, and by the age of 25 after passing a series of intensive math and technical exams, Heinz-Guenther was selected out of 500 men by a German business that was developing computing scales to represent the company in America. He became a naturalized U.S. citizen and moved to Hawai‘i in 1959, later founding a real estate company, a computer college, and his own math education program.

A great joy for him was demystifying math for his students of all ages, taking away intimidation around the subject by teaching fun-filled methods and shortcuts to build their skills and comfort levels. A man of many interests, hobbies and successful entrepreneurial endeavors, he was also a beloved husband to Diana Canada, who shared in

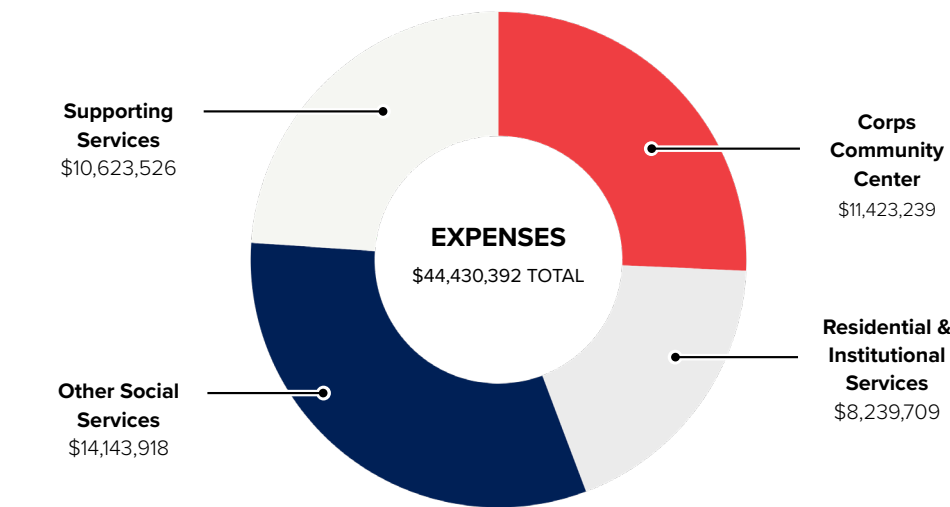
his support for the work of The Salvation Army.

Particularly drawn to The Salvation Army’s programs bringing shelter, spiritual enrichment, and academic learning opportunities to at-risk youth, Heinz-Guenther wanted to make a lasting impact in the lives of young people often neglected, abused or abandoned as he once was. Heinz-Guenther passed away before he could finalize his planned giving arrangements for The Salvation Army Hawaiian and Pacific Islands Division, but his wife Diana knew that carrying on this wish was one way to help honor his legacy—reflecting his love of God, positive attitude, and compassion for others. Diana graciously gifted The Salvation Army with an endowment in Heinz-Guenther Pink’s memory that will have a transformational impact on Hawai‘i’s keiki for years to come.
