That's why we are so grateful for your generous support.



## Helping people overcome obstacles and achieve their goals

Finding a new job can be one of the most challenging hurdles for those facing adversity. That's why the Employment Services Program at The Salvation Army Freedom Center is a critical resource for the West Humboldt Park community

For David Banks, the services he received were transformational. His journey started with the **Harbor Light** rehabilitation program and carried through employment services.

In 2018, David found Harbor Light, and his life was changed forever.

"I was on a rollercoaster at the time,"
Banks said. "Without The Salvation
Army, I would probably be in jail or
on the street. They turned me around.
They never gave up on me. They
always kept me in their corner.
They got me back on track."

Once David was clear of his vices, he started making real progress. First, David became a Soldier in The Salvation Army; then, he achieved his dream of working for the Chicago
Transit Authority. "I said, 'I want to get into the CTA, I've been trying to get in for three years.'" Banks said. "The Salvation Army told me, 'We have the Second Chance Program that works with the CTA.' I got into the program and started working with the CTA as an apprentice."

With partners like the Chicago Transit Authority, Amazon, and Eco Direct Laundry & Cleaners, the Second Chance Program is designed so that most people who want to work can find meaningful employment.

The program offers much more than just a job. It equips individuals with essential skills through resume and cover letter writing classes, mock interviews, and transportation assistance.

David's journey is a testament to the program's effectiveness. "Right now, I'm a customer service assistant; my next step is to operate," Banks said. "That's what I'm working on right now is to be a train operator. And I'm grateful.

"The Salvation Army showed me a way to get David back into David's life. To understand what David wanted to do. I had to teach me in order to get where I'm at today and The Salvation Army paved that way. And I'm grateful."

Though the road was challenging, David's story demonstrates that it was worth it. His success is a testament to the life-changing impact of The Salvation Army's Employment Services Program, helping individuals overcome obstacles and achieve their goals.

"My mom is a single parent, so cost was a worry," Dixon said. "She told me it sounded awesome, but she was just nervous, so she was hesitant to let me go. Captain AJ (Zimmerman from Englewood's Red Shield Corps) eased her worries."

Luckily, cost isn't an issue for most children. Thanks to our wonderful donors, scholarships are available, allowing more kids to experience the world outside Chicago.

"I think it had a significant impact on me. It opened my eyes to something totally different," Dixon said. "Camp opened my eyes to the world."

For many, Salvation Army programs offer a lifeline to opportunities they might never have imagined.

"While it may seem like there's no way out, The Salvation Army offers an escape," Captain Corey Hughes, Harbor Light Corps Officer, said. "The camps allow the young people to get away and just be young people."

Camps serve as a sanctuary where children can cast aside their worries and revel in the freedom of being themselves. As Captain Hughes says, "It's amazing. They go home changed."




